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Prices skyrocket at Dairy Shorthorn milking herd dispersal

The mid year dispersal sale of Malcolm and Ian Douglas's Tuerong prefix Dairy Shorthorn milking herd

in Victoria at the Shepparton Selling Centre, proved once again that the popularity of the breed really does spread far and wide resulting in the herd being snapped up by buyers from not only various areas of Victoria but Tasmania and New South Wales. Semen being was sold to breeders as far away as Western Australia.

What was also telling about the breed's popularity was the best price the Douglas bothers received for a cow.

Top price of was \$6000 for Tuerong JN Biddy 30th, pictured on the front page, a third generation royal grand champion, who calved in September.

The mature cow was bought by Peter Price of Leongatha, who also picked up Tuerong Lady Melba 21, joined to Sequa Barri Shorty 4 and by Willow Park High Society for \$3000 and Tuerong Maffra Lorna 3 joined to Tuerong SG Pretender for \$3400.

Through and through the sale did not disappoint, with a record-breaking breed average of \$2635. The 49 Dairy Shorthorn females offered averaged \$2635, while 11 bulls sold averaged \$2687.

Dairy Shorthorn Association President, Karen Doggett, said what was particularly interesting was that many of the buyers who had purchased Dairy Shorthorns at the Smith's dispersal sale in March 2014, had become members of the association and returned for more Dairy Shorthorns from the Tuerong sale to go into their milking herds.

#### To NSW...

DSHA member, Sophie Tomkins of Gollan, NSW, was one person who brought up Tuerong cattle to add to her existing herd. She put her plans in place as soon as she knew the milking herd was being sold.

Sophie purchased seven females and one bull from the Douglas brothers and their arrival got attention on the front page of Sophie's hometown newspaper, The Wellington Times.

Sophie was quoted as saying she was excited about continuing the breed. She began looking for them 15 years ago and after searching New Zealand, Ireland and the UK, she realised how rare Dairy Shorthorn cattle had become.

"They are also good mothers," she said.

"They are a good quality meat and very different to farming fashionable muscle breeds with a high growth rate."

The Tuerong cattle join the rest of those at the Tomkins' property.


#### The website

He is sired by Swinsongrange Challenger (U.K.) who is an imported sire of the 1960s and his dam is the top priced cow at the Tuerong dispersal, Tuerong JN Biddy 30.
